**Annual Tulare County Science Olympiad** 

Divisions B&C – College of the Sequoias – March 10, 2007 Division A – El Diamante High School – April 14, 2007

Science Olympiad tournaments are rigorous academic interscholastic competitions consisting of a series

of individual and team events. These events are balanced between the various science disciplines of

biology, earth science, chemistry, physics and technology. There is also a balance between science facts,

processes, skills and applications. Locally, over 750 students from more than 30 schools compete in the

annual competitions. The Science Olympiad is divided into three divisions: Division A - grades 3 - 6;

Division B - grades 6 - 9; and Division C - grades 9 - 12.

The Division B and C competition will be held at the College of the Sequoias in Visalia, Saturday, March

10, 2007. Students from sixth through twelfth grade will be launching rockets, building bridges, solving

science crimes, designing experiments and participating in a variety of engaging scientific explorations.

Individual and team awards are presented with the top three teams in the B and C Divisions advancing to

the NorCal State Science competition. The 2007 NorCal State Science competition will be held on

April 21, 2007, at University of California, Merced.

Division A is held at El Diamante High School, Visalia, on Saturday, April 14, 2007. Students from third

through sixth grade will be building circuits, designing clay boats, dropping eggs to see if they survive,

launching rockets and participating in fun-filled science activities. Individual and team awards will be

presented at the conclusion of the event.

"Students and coaches spend a great deal of their own time preparing for these events," says Tulare

County Superintendent of Schools Jim Vidak. "That's part of the reason Science Olympiad is so amazing

to watch." The Division B and C events begin March 10 with opening ceremonies at 8:20 a.m.

Competitions will begin at 8:30 a.m. throughout the COS campus with the awards ceremony scheduled

for 2:30 p.m. in the Quadrangle. The Division A event begins on April 14, with an opening ceremony on

the El Diamante campus at 8:30 a.m. Individual competitions begin at 9:00 a.m.

Science Olympiad is an international non-profit organization devoted to improving the quality of science

education, increasing student interest in science, and providing recognition for outstanding achievement

in science education by both students and teachers.
