

First Annual Student Tech Showdown held during popular Tech Rodeo



On Saturday, students participating in the Student Tech Showdown experienced something adults often encounter in the workplace – a request to make a presentation on the spot. While students – working in groups of two or three – knew weeks in advance of the new competition that they would be speaking about the issue of cyberbullying, they did not know the applications they would be required to incorporate into their presentation. To begin the competition, event coordinator Katherine Goyette gave nine teams of students three applications to include – Google Maps, Google Slides, and Screencastify, a simple video creation tool used by teachers and students.

Utilizing the research they had previously conducted on the realities of cyberbullying and its social-emotional effects on students, the teams developed presentations that made use of the three apps and included action plans to combat cyberbullying. Participants were given the opportunity to develop their presentation and then present it before their peers. Other teams offered helpful suggestions, which the presenting team could consider before making their final presentation before judges late Saturday morning. For their efforts in developing compelling multimedia presentations, the following teams received medals:

Elementary Division (Grades 4-5)

Collaborative Designer Award: Tech Thunder from Denton Elementary School Resourceful Digital Citizen Award: Dynamic Dudes from Denton Elementary School

Middle School Division (Grades 6-8)

Collaborative Designer Award: Captain Jack's Sparrow from Sundale Union School Resourceful Digital Citizen Award: The Big Brains from Sundale Union School

High School Division (Grades 9-12)

Collaborative Designer Award: Mustangs from Tulare Western High School and New Yorkers from Tulare Union High School

Resourceful Digital Citizen Award: SCCA Tech from Summit Charter Collegiate Academy and New Yorkers from Tulare Union High School



The new Student Tech Showdown was part of the Fourth Annual Tech Rodeo conference which was attended by over 150 educators from throughout the Central Valley. The conference began with fireside-style presentations by nationally-known educators and authors Jon Corippo and Tara Martin. During their keynote presentations and in following breakout sessions, Ms. Martin taught educators to engage students in annotating and analyzing text using Google Slides in a way that leveraged their interest in Snapchat, while Mr. Corippo guided educators in utilizing technology with simple, open-ended protocols that are applicable for nearly any content area and grade level.

Following these presentations, attendees were able to choose from a variety of breakout sessions led by award-winning presenters from across the state – all designed to foster 21st century learning in their classrooms through the use of technology. Scholarships available to graduating seniors

The Tulare County Office of Education is proud to announce its annual *Pursuing Victory with Honor* (PVWH) Scholarship is available for up to eight graduating seniors who plan to attend a college or university in the Fall 2020. *Pursuing Victory with Honor* is the character education program developed by the creators of CHARACTER COUNTS! as a tool for coaches to instill good sportsmanship in their players.



Tulare County seniors are invited to submit an application for the

scholarship by April 3 and include an essay on sportsmanship. The program will offer \$500 scholarships to as many as eight students attending high school in Tulare County. To apply for the PVWH scholarship, complete and submit the application at <u>tcoe.org/PVWHscholarship</u> by April 3.

Additionally, TCOE partners with the **Tulare County School Boards Association** (TCSBA) to promote their annual scholarship program. TCSBA typically awards a scholarship to one senior in each Tulare County high school and charter high school that submits an application. This



year, \$350 scholarships are being offered. Application packets were mailed this week to all high school counselors. Students may access the application at <u>tcoe.org/TCSBAform</u>. Completed applications are due to students' assigned high school counselors by February 21.

Mr. Murray is passionate about creating school cultures where support staff, teachers,



and administrators work together to help today's modern learners thrive.
