

# Educational Resource Services creates Quick Tip Videos to share with teachers and families



Yesterday, Educational Resource Services (ERS) posted the first release of its Quick Tip Videos for educators, families, and students. The two- to five-minute videos were created by the curriculum specialists and can be accessed through TCOE's Distance Learning website at tcoe.org/DistanceLearning/QuickTipVideos.

Among the seven videos uploaded to the Distance Learning site are two from Katherine Goyette, ERS's Educational Technology curriculum specialist. Through her videos, Ms. Goyette provides viewers information on how Google Sites and Google Keep can be used to support students' research and writing projects. Lisa Lemus and Tim Budz, English Language Arts/English Language Development curriculum specialists, teamed up to present a lesson on informational writing. Other videos address reading strategies, history/social science content, and the use of images in mathematics and other disciplines. The collection of Quick Tip Videos will continue to grow, providing teachers and parents educationally-sound concepts across all content areas and multiple grade levels for students in distance learning environments.



"Distance learning has been a challenge for everyone involved in education," said Tim Hire, Tulare County Superintendent of Schools. "I appreciate the curriculum specialists at ERS taking the lead to provide some instructional strategies for teachers and some resources parents and students can utilize as we all learn from home."

The California Center on Teaching Careers (The Center) is holding a statewide virtual recruitment fair May 28 from 4:00 until 6:00 p.m. Teachers and teacher candidates are invited to register to participate in the fair, which simulates the look of a real recruitment fair through an online platform.

Since The Center held its first virtual recruitment fair in 2018, these events have allowed teachers and teacher candidates worldwide to remotely meet with numerous participating California education agencies. Inside the virtual fair, registered attendees can conduct live chats and videoconferences about job openings at districts and county offices of education throughout the state. Uncredentialed candidates also have opportunities to visit with representatives from participating universities and alternative certification agencies to learn how to start a credential program application.
