Tulare Kings College and Career Collaborative holds triennial Impact Celebration event



Last month, the College and Career program convened a meeting of the Tulare Kings College and Career Collaborative (TKCCC) to share data and celebrate the contributions of K12, post-secondary and workforce partners. TKCCC meets every three years for its Impact Celebration to report on progress made in preparing Tulare and Kings county students for college and career, and to honor the men and women in education and industry who made a difference in advancing the mission of the organization.

Joy Soares, director of TCOE's College and Career program, reports that in the past six years, the state-recognized TKCCC network has attracted over \$52 million dollars in grants and other funds for college and career readiness

work. It was also reported that – prior to the pandemic –the amount of in-kind donations of time provided by industry partners had grown to \$5.4 million. The amount represents the value of employer's time in providing job shadows, guest speaking, and internships to students. "Six years ago, we began with several supportive partners to build a sustainable system of support," Soares said. "When we tracked the value of the contributions in the first year, it was under \$1 million. Prior to the pandemic in the 2018-19 school year, we had risen to \$5.4 million and I'm pleased to say that we're steadily climbing back to that number."

Conference attendees also learned that, despite the pandemic, the TKCCC region high schools grew their Early College Credit offerings from 146 courses in 2019-20 to over 200 courses during the 2020-21 school year. The courses were created with the region's community colleges, including College of the Sequoias, Fresno City College, Reedley College, Porterville College, and West Hills College. Presenters also showed attendees the positive trend in students completing career pathway programs in the two-county area. In four years, the number of students who finished pathway programs in the 21 partner high schools rose by 1,000.

Sharon Twitty, executive director of the statewide ARCHES (Alliance for Regional Collaboration to Heighten Educational Success), also spoke to the group, saying, "As I support this type of collaborative work across the state, I have found that the TKCCC structures and practices are to be held up across the state as a best example of college and career systems work. ARCHES honors this partnership along with the student outcomes TKCCC strives to produce." ARCHES is a statewide association of regional collaboratives working to eliminate opportunity gaps and improve college and career readiness for California students.

Mission Oak wins Central Section title



Mission Oak High School volleyball defeated Reedley to win the CIF Central Section Division V Championship Saturday at West Hills College Lemoore. Seeded fifth, Mission Oak, located in Tulare, upset third-seeded Reedley 3-0 with set wins of 25-12, 25-22, and 25-18.

Senior outside hitter Sariah Serrano led Mission Oak with 14 kills, 12 digs, and two aces. Senior outside hitter and defensive specialist, Margaret Arambula, had 12 kills and 14 digs. Freshman libero Aurora Sotelo had 18 digs and three aces. Senior setter Rilynn Fien had 20 assists while sophomore setter Rebekah Beasley had seven.

This was Mission Oak's first Valley championship title since 2017 when the team won the Division III title.

Mission Oak's season ended on Tuesday with a 3-0 loss to top-seeded Santa Clarita Christian in the first round of the CIF Southern California Regional Championship tournament. The Hawks were seeded 16th and finished the season with a record of 15-21.
