

## 27th annual Excellence in Education Awards held this morning



This morning at the Visalia Convention Center, 28 exceptional Tulare County educators and school employees were honored at the 27th annual Excellence in Education Awards – an event co-hosted by EECU. The nominees were submitted by Tulare County school districts and the Tulare County Office of Education in three categories – Administrator/Manager of the Year, Teacher of the Year, and School Employee of the Year. A committee of Tulare County business and educational leaders individually reviewed and scored each nominee to determine the winners, who were announced in May.

At the conclusion of the event, the category winners posed with Tulare County Superintendent of Schools Tim Hire (above right). The winners were (left to right) School Employee of the Year Jeff Lemos (Tulare County Office of Education), Teacher of the Year Manuela Silveira (Tulare County Office of Education), and Administrator/Manager of the Year Michael Akins (retired, Dinuba Unified School District).

"These men and women – regardless of their roles and responsibilities – have shown tremendous leadership, finding solutions to every challenge. 

# Tickets available for the production of Disney's The Lion King Jr.

The musical will be performed outdoors November 17-20 at the Eleanor Roosevelt Community Learning Center amphitheater in Visalia. Doors will open at 6:30 p.m. for the 7:00 p.m. shows. "We are thrilled to be hosting a live theatre event after such a long wait!" said co-director and choreographer Nicole Zweifel. "We are proud of the virtual work we have done during the pandemic and have met many new performers during the process. But nothing can replace the thrill of a live performance. It is why our company exists!"

Zweifel, who will retire next month, joined the young Theatre Company as a part-time choreographer in 1999. In 2001, she became the company's full-time choreographer. "One of Nicole's many strengths is her ability to work magic with students through movement and dance in the widest range of musical styles – from quiet, ethereal productions such as *The Secret Garden* to large, raucous shows such as *West Side Story*," said Bethany Rader, Theatre Company director. "Her expertise has been one of the reasons Theatre Company shows look as professional as any adult company."

The Lion King Jr. is based on the 1994 animated musical film The Lion King, which won two Golden Globes and two Academy Awards. The production tells the story of the lion cub, Simba, who deserts the throne after believing his father's death was his fault. Living in the jungle with his new friends, Timon and Pumbaa, Simba is reminded that he is the rightful heir and returns home to save Pride Rock.

## Foster Youth Services to hold two-day education summit

TCOE's Foster and Homeless Youth Services Program will be hosting its annual Education Summit November 29 and 30. Social workers and educators in all school settings are invited to attend the two-day event, which will feature keynote speakers Dr. Adolph Brown on November 29 and Max Stossel on November 30. An in-person cost of poverty experience will be offered to attendees during the afternoon sessions both days.

#### **Keynote Presenters**

Dr. Adolph Brown III is an American businessman, author, urban and rural school educator, research scientist, and keynote speaker. Dr. Brown is best known for inspiring all who hear him to learn, laugh, and lead, while as an implicit bias speaker simultaneously reducing unconscious bias at every turn. Dr. Brown knows that understanding structural inequities is only the start, however dismantling the foundations from which these structures are built leads to solutions.

Dr. Brown credits much of his success to the luxury of humble beginnings, being reared by a single-parent mother in abject poverty of the inner city housing projects infested with gangs, drugs, and violence. He became the first in his family of five to participate in Head Start, graduate high school, and attend college.



Dr. Brown is the author of acclaimed books, including the international mental wellness best seller, *Two Backpacks*. Other best sellers authored by Dr. Brown include a business soft skills classic, *Championship Habits*, and the education classic, *Real Talk*. He is also the co-author with his third grade teacher of a children's book, *It's Gonna Be A Great Day!* 

Max Stossel is an award-winning artist and the youth and education advisor for the Center for Humane Technology (CHT), an organization of former tech insiders dedicated to realigning technology with humanity (as featured in *The Social Dilemma* on Netflix). Before working with CHT, Stossel was a media strategist with an extensive background in social, running social media for multinational brands, and later working for a social media company where he designed some of the notification structures to distract people that he now raises awareness about.

Stossel spent the past five years speaking with 100,000+ students, parents, and educators around the world about social media's impact on our lives, and creating resources to help manage that impact. Stossel provides a unique and much-needed perspective on the role of technology in our homes, schools, and in our society.

"It gives an opportunity for schools, organizations, and communities to make a visible stand against alcohol, tobacco and other drugs, and to show their commitment to a drug-free lifestyle through the symbol of the red ribbon."
