

National History Day held virtually, 22 projects selected to advance to state competition



In their National History Day senior group documentary, Addison Reardon, Hannah Wegley, and Hollen Wegley of University Preparatory High School (UPHS) explored how vocal music was encoded with messages to guide slaves to freedom along the Underground Railroad during the early- to mid-19th century. For their work on the documentary, the students were selected as finalists and received "Best of Event" honors at the annual competition held virtually last Friday.

Students from seven Tulare County schools entered 41 projects in National History Day – Tulare County, exploring the national theme, *Communication in History: The Key to Understanding*. Students worked in groups or individually to produce documentaries, papers, exhibits, and websites investigating how communication has affected history. The projects included a broad range of history and human endeavor, including medicine, technology, human rights, languages, and conflict.

TCOE coordinates with public health department and 17 districts to administer vaccines



On Friday and Saturday, 675 educators from 17 Tulare County school districts received the first of their two-part COVID-19 vaccines thanks to a partnership with the Tulare County Public Health Department. County Superintendent of Schools Tim Hire coordinated with superintendents of the 17 districts to prioritize the vaccinations for district educators with direct student contact.

Porterville Unified hosted the event at Monache High School on Friday for 13 south county districts. On Saturday, Dinuba Unified hosted the vaccination clinic for four north county districts at Washington Intermediate School. In addition to staff from the public health department, TCOE managers and school nurses supported the events.



"I greatly appreciate the partnership with the public health department in making this supply of vaccinations available to educators," said Mr. Hire. "I also appreciate that the districts selected to participate in this round of vaccinations moved so quickly to take advantage of the supplies." Mr. Hire reports that TCOE will continue to work with the public health department to create vaccination clinics for districts in other areas of the county as supplies become available.

Participating districts included Alta Vista School, Burton School District, Cutler-Orosi Joint Unified School District, Dinuba Unified School District, Ducor Union School, Hope School, Kings River Union School, Monson-Sultana Joint Union School, Pleasant View School, Porterville Unified School District, Richgrove School, Saucelito School, Springville Union School, Strathmore Union School District, Sunnyside Union School, Terra Bella Union School District, and Woodville Union School.
