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Final graduation ceremonies for 2021-2022 school year held



This week, TCOE held its final graduation ceremonies for the 2021-2022 school year. On Monday afternoon, four young people graduated from TCOE's Court/Community School Program.

Since 2016, the program has used online PowerSchool coursework to enable seniors placed in the program to complete needed classes in order to graduate rather than return to their home high school or complete their degrees at an adult school program.

At the ceremony, the graduates honored the teachers, social workers, and student transition specialists who helped them along the road to their big day.

On Tuesday morning, dozens of family members, teachers, and administrators gathered at a colorful ceremony at the Claude Meitzenheimer Community Center in Tulare to watch 15 young adults receive their certificates of completion.

The graduates, who are or will be 22 years old this year, were students in Special Services AcCEL Programs in Tulare, including the Community Based Instruction Programs. Many of the graduates are transitioning to community-serving adult programs.

Springville's Connor Machado wins national writing award

Each year, nearly 70,000 students from around the nation enter the Veterans of Foreign War's (VFW) Patriot's Pen essay contest for a chance to win their share of more than \$1.4 million in state and national awards.

The essay contest encourages students, grades 6-8, to examine America's history, along with their own experiences in modern society, by drafting a 300- to 400-word essay based on a patriotic theme chosen by the VFW Commander-in-Chief. This year's theme was "How Can I Be A Good American?"



Connor Machado from Springville Union School won at the state level and was recognized at nationals along with winners from 53 states and territories. His essay, which appears below, was awarded the \$500 Veterans of Foreign Wars, Department of Mississippi and Auxiliary Award.



Monache becomes county's first-ever softball state finalist



On Saturday, Monache High School became the first-ever Tulare County softball team to play for a CIF Regional Championship. Monache (24-8-1) was also the county's lone CIF Central Section softball champion.

No. 5 Monache defeated No. 2 Wasco (28-4) 2-0 in the CIF Central Section Division III Championships on May 27 to earn a spot in only the second-ever state championship tournaments. The team earned a first-round bye then an 11-3 semifinal-win over No. 5 Elsinore (22-9) from Wildomar, advanced them to the CIF Southern California Division IV Championship game. No. 1 Monache lost the championship game 8-6 to No. 2 Orange Cove (29-6). Orange Cove was also the CIF Central Section Division IV champions.

Unlike many of the state's championship tournaments, softball and baseball do not have overall state champions. The tournament ends with north and south regional championships.
