

The Tulare County Office of Education welcomes three administrators



Three administrators have joined TCOE programs recently, including Court/Community Schools, Leadership Support Services, and Maintenance and Operations.

Joe Andrade, Court/Community Schools

Last semester, Joe Andrade, the former chief of staff/learning director for the La Sierra Military Academy (LSMA), was selected as principal of the Court/Community Schools. Andrade, who joined LSMA in 2013, is based at the Juvenile Detention Center, where he oversees a staff of five teachers and a career technical education (CTE) instructor. He has plans to expand CTE options at the Juvenile Detention Center, which serves an average of 80 adjudicated students per month. Currently, the school offers construction trades instruction in a state-of-the-art vocational center. Andrade also oversees TCOE's only community school, Mid-County Community School, for students expelled from their home districts. Andrade is a veteran of the United States Navy and a retired California state corrections officer.

Cari Carlson, Leadership Support Services

Joining TCOE's Leadership Support Services from Reef-Sunset Unified School District (RSUSD), Cari Carlson is a new administrator for TCOE's Leadership Support Services. In her role, Carlson will support districts and schools with continuous improvement efforts through Differentiated Assistance (DA) and Comprehensive Support and Improvement (CSI). This work includes supporting districts with the development of Local Control Accountability Plans (LCAP) and school sites with the Single Plan for Student Achievement (SPSA). She will also serve as the TCOE contact for Williams Act inspections across the county. Carlson began her career in education in 1996 and most recently served as an assistant superintendent of learning, director of student services, and principal for Kings County's RSUSD. She previously worked for TCOE from 2017 to 2020 with New Teacher & Leadership Development and Educational Resource Services. Carlson possess a bachelor's degree from Montana State University, Bozeman and a master's from California Polytechnic State University, San Luis Obispo.

Jack Schreuder, Maintenance and Operations

Coming from Dinuba Unified School District (DUSD), Jack Schreuder is the new Director of Operational Services within the Maintenance and Operations department. Schreuder will oversee the maintenance of TCOE's Mooney Boulevard, Doe Avenue, Liberty Campus, and the Dream Center. His responsibilities also include the maintenance of over 100 classroom buildings and the centers operated by Special Services, including the L.B. Hill Learning Center (Porterville), Maple Learning Center (Tulare), Occupational Training Center (Visalia), and Yettem Learning Center. He was the director of facilities at DUSD for nearly 10 years, overseeing 10 school sites, a vocational center, athletic fields, the district office and maintenance warehouse. Schreuder held a similar position for 15 years with Corcoran Unified School District. He is a veteran of the United States Marine Corps.

Two TCOE programs receive LEAP Awards from state and Nutrition Policy Institute



Last month, TCOE's Early Childhood Education (ECE) and Nutrition Education Obesity Prevention programs were recognized by the Nutrition Policy Institute and the California Department of Public Health with a 2023 LEAP Award for achievements in supporting healthy eating and active living. ECE's Richgrove Child Development Center (CDC) earned the LEAP Award for its health promotion practices in the areas of nutrition, physical activity, and breastfeeding support. Richgrove CDC partners with Kaweah Health, which collaborates with the Local Health Department and CalFresh Healthy Living program, to plan and implement health promotion projects.

Alexandra Rogers of TCOE's Nutrition Education Obesity Prevention (NEOP) Program, was also recognized with a 2023 LEAP Award for the development of the school garden at Terra Bella Elementary. Students take ownership of the garden, learning responsibility as they work together to plant, pull weeds, rake, harvest, and remove old crops. The students are currently in the process of harvesting winter crops that they will also be able to eat. Their winter crops include carrots, radishes, and onions. Students will begin planting spring crops soon. Richgrove CDC and the Terra Bella garden are among 131 schools, 124 early care and education programs, and 78 out-of-school time programs across California to receive this award.
