

Migrant Education utilizes Save the Children grant to hold first food giveaway



On Saturday, staff members of the Migrant Education Program (MEP) held the first of three food giveaways planned this year for Tulare and Kings county families served by the program.

Families braved the fog to travel to the Mooney Administration Building to receive 33-pound boxes of frozen chicken, canned goods, and Valley-made tortillas thanks to a two-year grant provided by Save the Children.

For over 30 years, the calendar
has highlighted the needs and
abilities of special education
students in Tulare County.

This year's calendar is entitled "Meeting Challenges: Through Partnerships in Education" and showcases various school staff, often teachers, going the



extra mile to help students and their families overcome unique challenges at school. One story features Keyandre Pope-Newton, a new student at Wilson Elementary School in Dinuba, and his teacher Michelle Cruz. By going the extra mile to build a partnership with Pope-Newton, Cruz helped foster a supportive environment for Pope-Newton's development.

"Schools and families have long understood the value of partnerships in education to foster increased attendance, higher academic outcomes, and a greater sense of wellbeing for students. When teachers and other school staff take the time to build relationships with families and students, everyone wins," the calendar reads.

State education code established the creation of CACs. In Tulare County, this 16-member committee is comprised of parents of students with special needs, parents of general education students, general and special education teachers, representatives from community agencies, and a student or adult with special needs.
