

ABC30 focuses on career technical education for latest Children First special airing Sunday



ABC30 has chosen to focus on career technical education (CTE) in its latest Children First special entitled "Ready for the Workforce." The special, which is hosted by news anchors Warren Armstrong and Jessica Harrington, airs Sunday, March 24 at 6:30 p.m. and streams on <u>www.abc30.com</u>. Among the segments are two Tulare County stories.

The agriculture program at Exeter Union High School is profiled with students demonstrating their welding skills plus their own juicing business. Exeter Union High School has the largest high school citrus farm in California.

Granite Hills High School's Law, Justice and Ethics Pathway (LJE) in Porterville will also be featured. The LJE program is just one of two similar high school programs in the nation providing students with stenography training and preparing them for the workforce.

The Tulare County Office of Education's Bill Davis, administrator for College and Career Readiness (CCR) is also featured – providing an interview on California's new \$500 million Golden State Pathway Program (GSPP). The program will support pathway development and enhancement through grants and technical assistance statewide. CCR will lead GSPP for the California Department of Education.

In Fresno County, through Children First partner Educational Employees Credit Union, students at Clovis West High School are getting experience working in the credit union's on-campus branch and helping to improve financial literacy among their classmates.

California Center on Teaching Careers wins award for virtual recruitment platform



This month, the California Center on Teaching Careers (the Center), was awarded Eventeer Awards' "Best Event in North America" for its virtual Statewide PK-12 Education Employment Fair. VFairs, the international virtual and hybrid events developer that created the Center's teacher recruitment platform, holds the Eventeer Awards annually. Worldwide, event planners from a variety of industries nominated over 130 virtual events with over 3,000 members of the public voting for their favorites in 27 categories. "The success of our recruitment platform is a testimony to the work of the team from vFairs," said Marvin Lopez, executive director for the Center. "Over the years, the improvement of the platform has resulted in greatly increased ease of use for both candidates and participating school districts."

Since launching in November 2018, the Center's recruitment platform has been used to hold more than 50 statewide and regional teacher recruitment events. Since the system's launch, over 40,000 educational professionals have connected with 723 California school districts, county offices of education, and universities offering employment or credentialing programs.

Lindsay Community Day announced as an inaugural Model Community Day School

On Monday, State Superintendent of Public Instruction Tony Thurmond announced that eight schools – including Lindsay Community Day (LCD) – had been selected as Model Community Day Schools (MCDSs) for 2024, the first year of implementation. Community day schools are schools for students who have been expelled from school or who have had problems with attendance or behavior. The MCDS Recognition Program is a partnership between the California Department of Education (CDE) and the California Continuation Education Association Plus (CCEA Plus).



"The honor of winning this award for Lindsay Community Day is a recognition that resonates for both learners and their families as well as our staff," said LCD principal Amalia Lopez. "As part of our district's learner-centered system, we strive to make Lindsay Community Day an opportunity space for learners, one that meets their needs and supports their goals and offers them a new sense of educational equity. This award is a reflection of the teamwork and commitment of the entire alternative education school staff. Go Knights!"

Lopez added that LCD's award builds on last year's success of the Lindsay Unified School District's continuation high school also being selected by the CDE as a model continuation school. During the three years that schools are designated as an MCDS, the CDE and CCEA Plus will identify them as resources for districts that are planning to establish new community day schools, and for new and existing community day schools that would like expert support to expand and deepen their educational practices.
