Palo Verde, Monson-Sultana win Anti-Tobacco/Marijuana Challenge Bowl



This week, the CHOICES Prevention Program hosted the annual Anti-Tobacco/Marijuana Challenge Bowl. Twenty-six teams of over 175 sixth and seventh graders battled it out in the game show-style event, answering questions about the harmful effects of tobacco and marijuana use, and the industries that promote their use.

Taking first place in the sixth-grade competition was the reigning champ, Palo Verde Union School from Tulare, while Kings River Union School finished in second place.

In the seventh-grade championship round, Monson-Sultana Joint Union School defeated Liberty Elementary School (Tulare) for first place.

Teams also participated in the Soapbox component of the competition, sponsored by the state Tobacco Use Prevention Education (TUPE) program. Teams created public service announcement (PSA) presentations, which will be judged later. Judges will select three teams to present their Soapbox PSAs live at the 2025 Lip Sync competition on May 2 at the Visalia Fox Theatre.



The Challenge Bowl was held again this year at Galaxy Theatres Tulare with support from Tulare Union High School Link Crew students. The competition is supported by TUPE and Friday Night Live.

Malakai Rodriguez, boys basketball: Coach Gallegos says that Malakai truly leads with heart every single day, whether on campus or in the community. He exemplifies


exceptional character, ethics, and sportsmanship, leaving a lasting impact through his dedicated community service. It has been an honor to watch him grow.

The Science & Engineering Fair was held on Saturday along with the annual STEAM Expo. This year, 85 students in elementary, middle, and high school worked to create 55 projects, applying the scientific method to explore issues in Physical Sciences, Life Sciences, Earth & Space, Engineering & Mathematics, and Behavioral & Social Sciences.

El Diamante's Chris Creason wins school's first-ever state title in wrestling



Last Saturday, six Tulare County high school wrestlers finished their seasons as medalists at the conclusion of the CIF State Wrestling Championships held at Mechanics Bank Arena in Bakersfield.

Winning his school's first individual state championship was El Diamante High School junior, <u>Chris Creason</u>. Competing in the 157-pound bracket, Creason defeated Leo Contino (Buchanan High School, Clovis) in a 4-1 decision. He is the 14th wrestler in Tulare County history to win an individual state championship.

Also for the boys at state, Caleb Rivas (120 pounds) of Mission Oak in Tulare placed seventh. Dominic Wilson (215) of Tulare Union placed eighth and finished his high school career as a three-time state placer.



For the girls, AlexAndrea Corona (120) of Monache in Porterville became the school's first-ever freshman medalist with a fourth-place finish. Audrey Segura (145) took seventh and finished as four-time state placer. Kayliegh Fernandez (105) of Visalia's Golden West placed eighth. Fernandez and Corona also helped lead Golden West and Monache, respectively, to CIF Central Section Division Championships.
